The principle hazard is the Risk of Infection with Coronavirus either by - 1. person to person transmission and face to face meeting or 2. contact with contaminated surfaces		Ensure that a COVID risk assessment has been carried out and the findings communicated to participants and the public Need to minimise contact with the public Selection of sites and tasks for the restart will depend on the ease of applying the controls set out below	
Person to person contact Situations when infection can occur.: -		Principle control measures are maintaining social distance (SD), reducing face to face working and regular washing/sanitising	Buy sanitising kit(s), wipes, dispenser bags to take wipes
Arrival on site		The advice is - no car sharing unless from same household.  Maintain SD when arriving on site Identify location of washing/sanitising kit	Have sanitising kit available
Briefing		Observe SD – horseshoe or circle Call a register – no sharing of pens etc. Check contact phone number is listed	Make sure register is up to date
Reducing person to person contacts		Set up work zones to reduce movement and achieve max separation of workers.  Prefer side by side rather than face to face Possible one-way routes around sites to reduce face to face contact.  Need for SD still applies	Markers may be needed to set out work zones
PPE		Use of PPE – hard hats, eye shields Gloves are NOT issued Face masks optional. Power tool PPE not shared	Buy extra kit – harness, hard hat, face screen and muffs

2. Contact with contaminated surfaces	Tools- the handling, sanitising, and sharing of tools	
Sanitizing tools and equipment	<ul> <li>Need to sanitise handles, need to supply sanitising kit – wipes, sprays and brushes to clean tools with</li> <li>Sanitizing at the end of a working session.</li> <li>This would provide a weekly sanitise to most tools notwithstanding some of the specific instructions listed with sanitising products</li> <li>Sanitising is mandatory if tools are swopped during the task period</li> <li>If tools are stored unused for a week, we understand that the potential contamination will have dissipated.</li> </ul>	Need to buy sanitising kit Need to check the science on contamination timings
Handling and sharing	<ul> <li>Reduce the risk by not sharing tools</li> <li>Reduce risk by wearing gloves</li> <li>Numbering of tools to avoid inadvertent shared use</li> </ul>	

## **VOLUNTEER WELFARE**

## **Health issues**

• We would ask that anyone with health problems or is listed as vulnerable, does not attend until such time as they are no longer at risk to themselves or others. As a group our task leaders are not medically trained and are not in a position to advise on risks to the health of individuals participating in our tasks

## **ICE**

We need to ensure that volunteers attending have registered and have updated their ICE phone numbers

## Self-isolating members.

Ideally, we should maintain contact with self-isolating members of the group to encourage and support their return when it is safe to do so.

## **New members**

Initially we feel that we cannot induct new members with these, new, unfamiliar constraints on our ways of working. Hopefully, we can welcome them in the future

## Communicate and review

We should agree ways of communicating these risk assessments to the volunteers. We should review these RA documents in the light of working with these new controls.

(We need to resolve how we would respond to a request for "track and trace" information if one of our attendees becomes infected)
